
















These are the objectives from the Early Years curriculum that we will be focusing on in Autumn 2 half term

Conkers Autumn 2 Knowledge Organiser

- count them individually (subitising)
- Recite numbers past 5
- Show 'finger numbers' up to 5
- Link numerals and amounts: for example, showing the right number of objects to match the numeral, up to 5
- Describe a familiar route
- Discuss routes and locations, using words like 'in front of' and 'behind'
- Make comparisons between objects relating to size, length, weight and capacity

- Talk about what they see using a wide range of vocabulary
- Explore how things work
- Begin to understand the need to respect and care for the natural environment and all living things
- Continue developing positive attitudes about the differences between people
- Talk about members of their immediate family and community
- Explore the natural world around them
- Describe what they see, hear and feel whilst outside

- using small world equipment like animal sets, dolls etc
- Join different materials and explore different textures
- Create closed shapes with continuous lines and begin to use these shapes to represent objects
- Explore colour and colour mixing
- Listen with increased attention to sounds
- Remember and sing entire songs
- Play instruments with increasing control to express their feelings and ideas

- Discuss what we see around us when out and about
- Encourage independence when getting dressed, eating and tidying up
- Counting everyday things (steps, fruit, cups on the table)
- Notice numbers in environment (house numbers, buses etc)
- Encourage children to cut up their own food with a knife and fork
